	A word that links the different parts of a sentence e.g. but, and, however, next, then.
	A word that replaces the name of a person, place or thing, e.g. he, she, it.
	A 'doing' word, e.g. walk, sleep, feel, ask, dance, fight.
	The name of a person, place or thing, e.g. John, street, dog, girl, France.
	This explains which point of view is used i.e. if someone is speaking, being spoken to or being spoken about. It can be first (I or we), second (you) or third (he, she, they or it.)
	A 'describing' word, e.g. interesting, useless, old, beautiful.
	When there is more than one of something, e.g. boys, rats, buses.
	This tells us when the action was done. The action can be in the past (I sat), the present (I am sitting), or the future (I will sit).
	When there is one of something, e.g. a boy, a rat, a bus.
	A word that describes an action, e.g. easily, nervously, happily, quickly.
